A101

Faith in Everyday Life



Workshop Leaders: Sean Chow & Shawn Kang

Offering Notes: Online & In-Person

Description: This workshop equips leaders to cultivate Christian practices through relational, community-based expressions of faith embedded in everyday life. Informed by the PC(USA)'s 1001 New Worshiping Communities movement and shaped by experience from the Presbytery of San Diego, it focuses on forming communities with those outside the church, where faith is lived through daily rhythms and relationships.

As participation in congregational life continues to shift, many remain spiritually curious yet disconnected from established patterns of church involvement. This moment calls for a renewed vision of Christian education, not primarily as curriculum delivery, but as formation through shared practices that shape everyday life. This workshop explores how Christian education can move beyond program-centered models toward practices rooted in homes, neighborhoods, and accessible community spaces. Participants in these groups will engage practices such as shared meals, Scripture, prayer, storytelling, and communal discernment that nurture belonging, spiritual growth, and faithful presence. Designed for educators, pastors, and ministry leaders, the workshop integrates theology with lived practice while offering practical frameworks for cultivating relational and sustainable faith communities.

Workshop participants will develop a contextual model for a “Faith in Everyday Life” gathering suited to their setting. The workshop also introduces approaches to identifying and developing leaders, sustaining small communities, and fostering ongoing participation. Participants will leave with an adaptable plan for implementation, practical tools for their context, and a renewed vision for how Christian education can take root through everyday practices and shared life.

Rev. Dr. Sean Chow serves as Executive Director of the Presbytery of San Diego, cultivating innovative ministries and changing culture. A leader in church planting and formation, he works at the intersection of faith, leadership, and everyday life.

Rev. Shawn Kang serves in the PC(USA)'s 1001 New Worshiping Communities initiative, helping launch and nurture new faith communities. He is dedicated to developing leaders and creating spaces where people can encounter faith in fresh and meaningful ways.

Linking the Stories of God's People

Description: When you wonder how the stories of scripture could possibly connect to your own. When you long for youth to see themselves in the disciples, the Israelites, or the story you're teaching this week. When you want to build deeper community within your congregation, your small group, your family, or among newcomers to the faith.

The story-linking process places our stories in dialogue with faithful disciples we know, and with those we encounter in scripture. Not just Bible stories.

Not just stories about famous saints or heroes of the faith.

But the stories we are living—right now.

Can You Be a Progressive Evangelical?



Workshop Leaders: Gini Norris-Lane

Offering Notes: Online & In-Person

Description: If faith is not primarily about going to heaven or avoiding hell, what is it about? How we articulate the answer to this question matters. What also matters, maybe even more so, is learning to understand the stories of those who have been hurt by the church, who are deconstructing faith, or whose fundamental questions - and yearnings - for God and for community are different than we think they are.

Jesus starts his ministry by proclaiming in Luke 4:18-19 that his purpose was to "proclaim good news to the poor, freedom for the prisoners, sight for the blind and to set the oppressed free." Workshop participants will explore what this verse can mean in our contexts. We will discuss how we are called to meet those who are hurt, skeptical, and questioning with compassion, and shape our programming around their needs and questions.

Rev. Dr. Gini Norris-Lane serves as the Executive Director of the UKirk Collegiate Ministries Association. She is passionate about helping college students and all of God's beloved children experience God's all encompassing love in community and explore how that love can shape who they are and how they serve. She loves watching football, going to soccer games, and going for coffee.

A104 Grandparents in the Faith Formation Journey



Workshop Leaders: Jaime Staehle & Anne Hagerman Wilcox

Offering Notes: Online & In-Person

Description: In many congregations, family faith formation has rightly focused on parents, but what about grandparents? Increasingly, grandparents are asking how they can more intentionally share faith with the children they love. They are present, invested, and often spiritually curious about their role.

This workshop explores how churches can equip and include grandparents as vital partners in intergenerational faith formation. Drawing on real-life examples and emerging practices, we'll consider how to adapt existing parent-focused initiatives to engage grandparents in meaningful, accessible ways.

At a time when the church is rediscovering what matters most, this conversation invites us to reconnect generations, honor the wisdom already present in our communities, and imagine how faith can be nurtured across the full span of life. Participants will leave with practical ideas, adaptable models, and renewed vision for engaging grandparents in the life of the church.

Jaime Staehle is a Certified Christian Educator and Director of Christian Education at Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church in NYC. She is excited to be able to present this workshop alongside her mom – grandparent to her two kids!

Education Professor Emerita, Anne Hagerman Wilcox, serves as Pedagogy Specialist for Whitworth University's Office of Church Engagement (Spokane, WA). A105 Good Bones: Evaluating and Adapting Children's Curriculum



Workshop Leaders: Rebecca Davis

Offering Notes: Online & In-Person, Micro-Credential

Description: Choosing curriculum that fosters life-long faith and discipleship with children is an essential aspect of our ministry. Sometimes the curriculum's approach to scripture matches our perspectives, but the activities won't work in our context of ministry. Other times the theme, music, and presentations are exciting, but the theology is inconsistent with our tradition. The reality is every curriculum must be adapted for our congregational setting. Let's explore how to evaluate the key elements of curriculum and how to adapt it when we cannot find the exact right one.

Rev. Dr. Rebecca Davis is the Sarah Belk Gambrell Professor of Christian Education, Director of the MACE degree and the Center for Excellence in Christian Education at Union Presbyterian Seminary. She is a Teaching Elder and a Certified Educator in the PCUSA. She has served the Church as an educator, pastor, associate presbyter, and in ecumenical non-profits.

A106 Partnership with Indigenous Communities

Workshop Leaders: Gord Brown

Description: The Christian Church has a complex history with the peoples indigenous to North America. All too often, this history has been bound up in the colonialist project of European settlers. And yet Indigenous Communities do come with deep Spiritual resources, especially regarding ecology, and these resources can be reconciled with and are strongly compatible with the broader Christian tradition and message. Consequently, we can all learn from the experiences of Post-Colonial Communities and thereby grow and move into God's intention for all God's peoples and all of God's good creation. This workshop developed by APCE's Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Advisory Council will help participants to appreciate of the joys and challenges in Post-Colonial ministries of and with Indigenous Communities.

APCE's Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Advisory Council has been tasked with helping APCE live into its commitment to all of God's Children for a Biblically-based Justice. This ministry is outlined in APCE's 2022 Diversity Statement found under the Diversity Tab at apcenet.org.

A107 More Than a Mirror Ball: What Disco & House Teach the Church

Workshop Leaders: Bill Buchanan & Jackson Ringley

Offering Notes: -

Description: Many congregations have statements of inclusion and may even fly inclusion flags as a symbol of welcome. But what does true inclusion look like? Join Jackson Ringley and Bill Buchanan (aka DJ5) for a discussion on the history of disco and house and how they give us a model to be a more inclusive and affirming body of Christ.

Bill Buchanan is a Presbyterian Pastor, Christian Educator and lifetime music nerd. He's also known as DJ5 and has hosted dance parties at numerous conferences and retreats. He lives in Asheville, NC.

Jackson Ringley is the Minister to Youth & Families at United Church of Chapel Hill, as well as the Director of Digital Ministries at Youth Mission Co. He has led numerous workshops on theology in pop culture, and is a rising leader in conversations about queer theology.

A108 Growing Pride in God's Word: Teaching LGBTQIA2S+ Justice to Children Using the Bible

Workshop Leaders: Jimmy Hoke

Offering Notes: -

Description: This interactive workshop will help Children's Ministry leaders develop lessons and teaching strategies that can introduce young learners to queer and trans stories in the Bible. We will focus on making connections between Bible stories and stories of LGBTQIA2S+ leaders in the past and present. This workshop is based on the instructor's successful experience creating and then teaching an LGBTQIA2S+-centered Sunday School curriculum that makes the depth of trans and queer biblical scholarship accessible and life-giving for young learners. After a presentation on how to create lesson plans using these forms of storytelling, participants will work together in small groups to put these skills into action to create mini lessons using resources and curated starting tools given to them by the instructor. In addition to the mini lessons they create together, participants will leave with sample lesson plans (provided by instructor), a list of resources, and skills to continue to create their own lessons to help children build their faith and discover more trans and queer stories in and around the Bible.

Dr. Jimmy Hoke is a freelance scholar and Christian educator who brings to life queer folks in and around the Bible for audiences as young as age 4 in addition to college, seminary, and adult learners. Dr. Hoke is passionate about helping children develop lifelong curious and creative engagements with the Bible (that they won't have to "unlearn" as adults). They are the Director of Children and Family Ministry at the House of Hope Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Dr. Hoke teaches courses in New Testament and Biblical Studies at United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities and Augsburg University. They are eagerly awaiting the publication of their second book, *Queering the Lectionary: Proclaiming the Gospels Subversively*—forthcoming this summer from Fortress Press.

A109 Fertility, Faith Formation, and Pastoral Care

Workshop Leaders: Lauren Hood

Offering Notes: -

Description: As Christians, our Scripture is not silent about fertility journeys, especially when deep pain from infertility is present. Sarah, Rachel, and Elizabeth point us to the complications of age with fertility and all the feelings when prayers for a child are not answered - the disappointment, self-esteem issues, and anger. In the bleeding woman who reaches for Jesus's cloak, we see the distress that severe bleeding can cause and the desperate need for healing. Even in deep pain and hopelessness, she takes the risk of trying one more time for healing. Lastly, the birth of Jesus is crucial to our faith AND can invoke jealousy that becoming pregnant was "so easy" for Mary.

Approximately 17.5% of people worldwide experience infertility. No fertility journey looks the exact same, even when treatments are the same. Infertility can be experienced for a variety of reasons, and often it is difficult to make sense of such an experience. These complications often lead to only worshipping digitally, avoiding communal activities until a pregnancy can be announced, or leaving the church completely.

This workshop will provide you with space to consider the needs of those who will, who are, and who have experienced fertility journeys that are untraditional or filled with complications- miscarriages, queer family planning, IVF, IUI, childless by choice, childless due to infertility, health diagnoses, egg/sperm donation, still birth, egg freezing, and more. You will leave this workshop with ideas for faith formation, considerations for worship and sermons, and practical ideas for pastoral care for families on a fertility journey.

Lauren Hood is the Director of Youth and cCollege Ministries at Preston Hollow presbyterian Church in Dallas, TX. She also recently graduated with MDIV and MACE degrees from Union Presbyterian Seminary. She is passionate about accessible discipleship, practical theology based in feminist and queer theology, and the complicated relationship between faith and fertility.

A110 When Dry Bones Speak: Creative Practices for Hearing Overlooked Voices in the Church

Workshop Leaders: Nicole Newton

Offering Notes: -

Description: What if some of the most important insights about faith, belonging, and the life of the church are coming from people we have not yet learned how to hear?

This workshop explores creative listening practices that help congregations hear the spiritual wisdom carried by voices often overlooked in church life, including neurodivergent individuals, children and youth, caregivers, older adults, people with disabilities, immigrants, and others whose experiences may not fit traditional forms of communication.

Through guided arts-based practices using drawing, symbol, metaphor, and visual storytelling, participants will experience new ways of listening that make space for people to share how they encounter God, community, and belonging. These practices create pathways for expression when words alone feel difficult, limited, or insufficient.

Rather than offering a packaged curriculum, this workshop invites participants into adaptable practices that can be used across many ministry settings. Together, we will explore what becomes possible when churches honor multiple ways of communicating, learning, and knowing.

Grounded in Ezekiel's vision of dry bones receiving breath and rooted in the belief that every person bears the image of God, this workshop invites congregations to listen differently so that overlooked stories can become living testimonies. In doing so, communities may discover that the voices they once struggled to hear are not on the margins of the body of Christ, but essential to its wholeness.

Participants will:

- Experience an arts-based listening practice
- Explore ways to hear voices often overlooked in church life
- Identify adaptable practices for their own ministry contexts

Nicole Newton is an Associate Pastor at Independent Presbyterian Church and DMin candidate at Wake Forest University School of Divinity. Her research explores arts-based practices that help neurodivergent people and their families share their experiences of faith and shape more inclusive congregations.

A111 Room for Wonder: Child-Friendly Worship Spaces

Description: What if our worship spaces truly reflected the value that children belong in worship? This workshop explores how the design and use of space across a variety of worship settings can invite children into meaningful participation while enriching worship for the whole community. Participants will discover practical and adaptable ideas for creating worship spaces that make room for wonder, movement, and intergenerational belonging.

A112 Every Age Holy: Finding the Story of Older Adults in the Scriptures

Workshop Leaders: Rachel (Rae) Watson

Offering Notes: -

Description: The lens we use when reading scriptures colors how we understand ourselves and our place in the story of the people of God. This workshop will help participants focus on the story of older adults in scripture. We will practice finding the older adults, whether named or hidden in between the words, and considering what their story teaches us about aging, changing bodies and minds, the community of faith, and how we live our faith every day of our lives. The participant will leave with several ways to introduce, build, and nurture older adult ministries that involve biblical interpretation, mission, and worship.

Rae Watson is the Associate Pastor of Christian Formation at Covenant Presbyterian Church, Staunton, VA. Rae is passionate about helping everyone, from our youngest to our oldest members, find their place in the ever-unfolding story of the people of God.

A113 Reconciliation Across Generations: Revisiting the Confession of 1967

Workshop Leaders: John Wilkinson

Offering Notes: -

Description: The adoption of the Confession of 1967 sixty years ago in Portland – along with the creation of a Book of Confessions – signaled a sea change in American Presbyterianism. The confession ("C67") offered new understandings of Jesus and the Bible, and invited Presbyterians to consider social justice issues – race, militarism, gender and poverty – through the framework of reconciliation (II Corinthians 5:18-19). For some, the confession was a breath of fresh air, while others viewed it much more critically. The adoption of the confession, and the Book of Confessions, also marked the beginning of a particularly contested period in Presbyterian life. In this workshop, we will... Briefly review the timeline that led to the confession's creation, dive into the content itself, explore its relevance for today's church, including how it may be used in worship and educational settings.

John Wilkinson serves as Vice President and Director of Stewardship and Funds Development for the PC(U.S.A.) He has served in diverse denominational and congregational settings, and his vocational and academic interest centers on the church's confessions and how they help shape faithful mission and ministry.

Description: Jesus regularly turned tradition upside down for the sake of God's kingdom. In the centuries that followed, the church has relied on their God-given imagination to create radical, life-changing programs like universal schooling, modern healthcare networks, and civic safety nets.

This fast-paced, highly interactive workshop is designed to break church leaders out of traditional mental ruts, helping them strengthen their "imagination muscles" to address any challenges faced by their congregation and broader community. Participants will engage in a series of collaborative, fun activities designed to stretch creative thinking and see new possibilities.

You'll leave with a toolbox of activities to use with teams, volunteers, and congregants to expand their imagination, creativity, and sense of hope for what the church can do.

Come be part of an interactive experience that reveals the cares, callings, and social concerns God has stirred within you—and meaningfully connects you with others who share kindred dreams for a better world. This flips the script, encouraging us to live out our faith where it matters most to us and inspiring us to build a community of purpose and justice in our churches and beyond. You'll leave fully empowered with the blueprint to recreate this profound encounter in your own church, galvanizing your people's passions and talents toward God's good work.

Description: In this workshop, we will discuss the importance of age-appropriate, faith-based conversations around sexuality, bodies, and identity with children of all ages, particularly early elementary-aged children. If we can move beyond our discomfort to engage in these conversations with young people, we will help them grow up to have healthy relationships with their bodies and respect for their own and others' boundaries. We will look at some common myths around sexuality education and engage in dialogue about why faith and the church should not be removed from these conversations. Whether you are a parent, a faith formation leader, a pastor, or someone simply interested in this topic, we invite you to join us for lively conversation and the sharing of resources to aid in these conversations at home and in your place of worship.

Rev. Debbie serves as pastor of the Madbury (NH) United Church of Christ, and has served as Minister of Christian Formation at five UCC congregations in NH and MA and on their conference staffs. She has written for three United Church of Christ-based curriculum resources, and resides in Derry, NH.

B203 Accessibility in Ministry: Trauma and Disability Informed Ministries in Practice

Offering Notes: Online & In-Person

Description: We know that being trauma and disability informed is vitally important, but actually implementing strategies that work can be a challenge. In our time together, we will journey through a brief overview of trauma and disability awareness in ministry. In addition, we will learn practical applications and hone how to best utilize them in various ministry settings. You will walk away knowing better how to care for all people in your ministry and be ready to put these new skills into practice.

B204 Faith through Adversity: A Roadmap for Resilient Leadership



Workshop Leaders: Meredith Montgomery & Anne Wilson

Offering Notes: Online & In-Person

Description: This workshop seeks to foster thought provoking reflection on the resilience of the human spirit and the quiet courage it takes to stand up for what's right. We are living through turbulent times where political polarization, economic disparities, and social and safety concerns have led to widespread anxiety as a nation. How do we find the strength to endure without losing our sense of purpose when the path forward seems unclear?

Together we will look to history for inspiration and offer an actionable roadmap for modern resilience. We'll first explore the story of how one Japanese American family navigated another challenging chapter in our nation's history—World War II. Hear the story of a teenager who was incarcerated in an internment camp after being uprooted from life as she knew it. Her future husband faced his own adversity, fighting in some of the war's fiercest battles to defend a country that deemed him the enemy. Told by their daughter and granddaughter, these stories of grace and dignity through atrocious acts of discrimination and injustice illustrate how maintaining one's identity and values can become a radical act of resistance.

Inspired by this couple's experiences, we'll then explore the Stockdale Paradox as a tool to navigate our own obstacles. This concept focuses on how to honestly acknowledge the hardships we face while holding onto the unwavering belief that we can—and will—overcome them. Attendees will leave with a renewed perspective that will ground them in their everyday lives and serve as a powerful mindset for courageous leadership.

Meredith Montgomery is the Executive Director of Walk Bike Nashville, a nonprofit advocacy organization dedicated to making Music City a place where all people have the freedom, dignity, and choice to move through a comprehensive and safe network of sidewalks, bikeways, and transit routes. Originally from Houston and a graduate of Kenyon College, her free time is spent at the soccer fields and camping with her family of four and their two rescue pups.

Anne Wilson is a seasoned educator who currently serves on several boards of non-profit, church-related or educational institutions. She is a Past President of APCE and recipient of a Sustain Life Achievement Award. She has served in numerous leadership roles in APCE.

B205 Youth, Mission, and Faith Development in Polarized Times

Workshop Leaders: Greg Allen-Pickett

Offering Notes: -

Description: In many congregations, youth faith formation can feel disconnected; belief separated from practice, learning detached from lived experience. At the same time, polarization continues to divide communities along political, theological, and cultural lines. What if mission and service could become the place where faith comes alive and where division gives way to shared purpose?

This workshop explores how mission can breathe new life into youth ministry. Through hands-on service and intentional reflection, young people encounter a faith that is active, relational, and deeply rooted in the love of Christ. Drawing on the presenter's experience in a "purple church"—and insights from "Purple Church, Red State" participants will explore how youth-led responses to community crises became catalysts for congregational transformation. After the Sandy Hook Elementary School shooting, youth helped lead efforts to address gun violence through prayer, service, and community engagement. Following the murder of George Floyd, youth again inspired faithful action, inviting the congregation into conversations and acts of justice and reconciliation. In both moments, mission and service created space for unity across difference.

Participants will leave with:

- A simple, repeatable action-reflection model for youth mission experiences
- Tools for helping youth theologically process service and justice work
- Strategies for building inclusive, relational youth communities across differences
- Ideas for connecting local and global mission to ongoing faith formation
- Practical examples from youth trips, service projects, and community responses

By reconnecting action and reflection, this workshop equips leaders to nurture a youth ministry where faith is lived and where even in divided times, God brings new life.

Greg Allen-Pickett serves as Senior Pastor of Lake Grove Presbyterian Church (OR). Author of "Purple Church, Red State: Finding Common Ground in an Age of Polarization", he helps congregations navigate polarization through faithful dialogue and shared mission.

B206 Your Church's 'Welcome' Banner ... Is It Lying?

Offering Notes: -

Description: This interactive workshop is about creating truly affirming spaces for LGBTQIA+ people — and understanding why the gap between intention and experience matters so much. "All Are Welcome" sounds right. But people who've been hurt by the church have learned to read the fine print, and LGBTQIA+ people in particular know how to spot a welcome that doesn't quite mean it. Drawing on experience with a wide range of congregations, seasoned church leaders will guide participants through practical strategies for making welcome real and legible across every dimension of church life: educational programming, worship, publicity and communications, physical spaces, practices of hospitality, and community outreach. Participants will leave with concrete ideas, honest self-assessment tools, and a renewed sense of why this work matters — not just for LGBTQIA+ people, but for everyone the church has ever left standing at the door.

Rev. Brian Ellison (he/him) is Executive Director of the Covenant Network of Presbyterians, an organization dedicated to LGBTQIA+ inclusion in the church. A seasoned leader, educator, and preacher, he has worked with congregations across the country on creating authentic welcome.

B207 These Living Bones: Writing for Renewal

Workshop Leaders: Julie Hester

Offering Notes: -

We'll also share some of our words with one another, building connections and community during a busy conference. You can take home prompts and practices to use in your ministry context, or just come to nurture yourself. No writing experience is needed.

B209 How Can Community Input Create Spirit-filled Flesh?

Offering Notes: -

Description: Some might call campus ministry, and often young adult ministry, a revolving door. This description has truth to it - with students graduating every year, the group is often completely different every 3 to 4 years. Young adults are also frequently moving for grad school or jobs. When there isn't much history for "We've always done it this way," there is a lot of room to be responsive to what students are wanting to learn about and do, yet we also need some constants to our ministry that ground us in our identity as disciples of Jesus. In campus ministry, we need to offer something that is both anchored as well as nimble and creative. What can we learn from this work to apply elsewhere?

This workshop will use lessons learned from almost a decade and a half in campus ministry to help participants explore how they might apply these lessons in their own contexts. How do we identify what is core to our community, both in identity and in what we offer, and use that as our foundation, while also finding room for adaptive responses to the present day needs and interests of our community, allowing for a greater sense of relevance? How do we figure out what input from our community will actually be helpful in shaping what we offer? Participants will explore this for their own context through opportunities for individual reflection and journaling along with conversation in pairs and small groups at different points during the workshop. They will leave knowing what questions they want to take back to their community to explore as a group, allowing for a practical application of what was discussed in the workshop that will hopefully bring revitalization to the communities we lead and nurture.

Rev. Megan LeCluyse is the Executive Director and Campus Minister of the Christian Association at the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. She is the author of "You're Not the Only One: Reflections on Faith, Doubt, Growing Up and the College Experience," a book to help college students explore their experiences at school through a lens of faith.

As pastors and educators we face particular challenges as we consider how and when to use our gifts for ministry in ways that both nourish our souls and further the work of the church by supporting the work of a new generation of leaders. What does it mean at this stage of life to 'run the race that is put before us'? How do we navigate the change from being the one in charge to becoming an authentic cheerleader for the new? Can we learn when to answer a fervent yes and when to assert a firm no? In a society that encourages us to define ourselves by the work we do, how do we redefine ourselves once again as simply a child of God who loves us?

In this workshop we will draw upon wisdom from James Fowler, Richard Rohr, Parker Palmer, and the vast wisdom in the room. We will talk honestly about our soul work alone and in community. We will consider the practice of creating an ethical will and living out our legacy in word and deed.

The Hebrew word for image is tselem- a visible expression of an invisible reality. Which means being made in God's image is not just about ontology. It's about creativity. Bringing life where there was none, reflecting God's love and justice for the world through us and giving the world a glimpse of God. From the very beginning of the story, God invites us to join in the work, constructing in places where heaven and earth. Our creativity is not a side note in the story of God. It is a critical part of it. When we get so busy with "doing" God's work and forget that we are God's work we lose the connection to our divine embodied wisdom. This workshop space will offer participants a chance to slow down and participate in guided meditation that will allow reconnection to Self and Creator, reflection through journaling to reflect on that experience of reconnection and then move into a time of free creative expression. She is a practical theologian who is living into her call to deconstruct systems and disrupt the status quo in order to seek liberation, justice, and belonging in solidarity with those living on the margins.

Dr. Lisa Hancock, Director of Worship Arts at Discipleship Ministries, is a lifelong United Methodist whose passion for worship and the arts began at 3.5 years old when she started singing in church choirs. Terra Divina ("divine earth"/"terra"=earth) is the spiritual practice of connecting to the divine Creator while engaging with God's creation. Valerie Grissom's ongoing research project, Lament with Children and Youth in Worship and Daily Life, includes interviews from over 41 ministry leaders, therapists, teachers, researchers, and theologians, as well as a plethora of biblical and sociological research, but it also is a curation of multi-sensory, embodied practices of lament to empower youth and children to lament in Christian communities. One theme that recurs in Valerie's research is the power of connecting people of all ages to God's divine earth (or the outdoors) to engage in spiritual practices of lament. This collaborative workshop will invite participants to share and learn from one another, and to experience a variety of ideas for enabling people of all ages to practice intergenerational lament through terra divina. These embodied terra divina practices can be adapted to be used in small groups, youth group, children's ministry, adult ministry, congregational worship, spiritual direction, and so much more. Come to connect yourself in these powerful embodied terra divina practices, so that you might facilitate lament through terra divina with others.

Adventure Play: A New Kind of Children's Ministry

Workshop Leaders: Andy Rausch

Offering Notes: -

Description: In this workshop, participants will be introduced to "Risky Adventure Play," a different way of doing children's and youth ministry that helps develop spirituality in children away from adult-guided activities and screens. Participants will see how our "new kind of VBS" worked to foster this development, and they will have an opportunity to engage in a little "adventure play" themselves, with ropes, pipes, and giant LEGO bricks! Children today are more and more tied to screens—computer screens, tablets, and especially phones. In his book *The Anxious Generation*, Professor Jonathan Haidt makes the argument that children are facing a mental health crisis because of their reliance on screens for information, entertainment and companionship. He writes, "The phone-based life produces spiritual degradation, not just in [children], but in all of us." The isolation of screen-based interactions robs children of their ability to develop spirituality, most richly nurtured through community and nature. He discusses the importance of encouraging children to discover who they are away from screens through "risky play"; with others. Rusty Keeler, author of *Adventures in Risky Play* and other books and podcasts, promotes "adventure play" as a means for children to grow and develop, physically, mentally and spiritually.

Andy Rausch is the pastor of Northminster Presbyterian Church, Salinas, CA. Andy has more than thirty years experience in children's ministry, and brings his passion for children's health and spirituality to everything he does.

D402 Can These Church Properties Live?



Workshop Leaders: Carl Horton

Offering Notes: Online & In-Person

Description: As ministry shifts across the church, once bustling buildings and filled parking lots now sit largely empty and underutilized for much of the week. Church properties intended for growth remain vacant and undeveloped, existing buildings become burdensome. But congregations and mid-councils across the country are approaching these property challenges as ministry opportunities, turning these liabilities into assets, breathing new life into church property for community good. We'll look at a number of visionary church property projects like affordable housing, childcare centers, healthcare centers, and other ministries that enrich and enliven both community and congregation. We'll overview the church-repurposing process, dig into the theological and biblical basis for this work, and explore the spiritual formation and practices of congregations committed to a new and innovative future life for their properties.

D403 These Bones Still Preach: Reclaiming the Spiritual Authority of Older Adults



Workshop Leaders: Denise Shannon

Offering Notes: Online & In-Person

Description: Too often, older adults in the church are seen primarily through the lens of care, decline, or nostalgia—rather than as vital spiritual leaders whose voices, stories, and theological insight are essential for the present and future of the church. Drawing on the imagery of Ezekiel's dry bones, this workshop invites participants to reconsider what has been dismissed or overlooked and to recognize the enduring spiritual authority carried by older adults. These are not "dry bones," but lives shaped by decades of faith, resilience, loss, and hope—lives that still have something to say.

Together, we will explore how congregations can move beyond passive or programmatic engagement to actively elevate older adults as teachers, storytellers, mentors, and leaders. Participants will be challenged to name and dismantle age-based assumptions while discovering practical ways to create spaces where older adults are not only included, but are recognized as essential voices in shaping the church's witness.

Rev. Denise Shannon is the pastor at Westminster Presbyterian Church in Westminster, CO, a certified spiritual director, owner of Sassy Preacher Lady Ministries and the Co-moderator for POAMN. Her work centers on developing meaningful ministry practices, especially with older adults.

D404 Culture Change and Centering Children: After the Bones, Two Sticks



Workshop Leaders: Patrick Reyes

Offering Notes: Online & In-Person

Description: Just after the dry bones rise, God hands Ezekiel two sticks and tells him to hold them together until they become one in his hand, a sign of divided people made whole. This workshop takes that image as a blueprint for culture change, and it puts children at the center of the work. Too often we treat culture as something the adults sort out and the children inherit. But the two sticks only become one when someone is willing to hold the tension long enough for it to bind. Children do this instinctively. They cross the lines we have hardened, they ask the questions we have learned to stop asking, and they refuse the false choice between this stick and that one. Together we will explore what it means to build communities where children are not the recipients of a culture handed down but active hands in the joining, and we will leave with practical, embodied ways to let their wisdom reshape how our congregations and classrooms hold what has come apart.

Rev. Dr. Patrick B. Reyes is the President of Auburn Theological Seminary, founded in 1818 and dedicated to building community, bridging divides, pursuing justice, and healing the world.

D405 When Dry Bones Break

Workshop Leaders: Sarah Bishop

Description: This workshop will allow APCE Annual Event participants to create a sacred space to share those moments of defiant and disarming laughter or clear the lungs with screams of holy rage that they have experienced as leaders in the church when their bones of ministry have become brittle or possibly broken. There are moments in ministry that need to be shared with help carrying the burden and also, you cannot make it up, uniqueness. In creating such a space to open up, share, realize one is not alone, they can name the holy rage or bold need to respond with laughter and then receive just a little antibiotic, and accept that first tentative bandage or splint then, when ready, allow another to share the peace of Christ and the kiss of reconciliation. This will be a space to share healing resources. And some out of the box responses, i.e., like those who have joined an improv group or annual memberships to theme parks or poetry writing or.... This can be a space to creatively resource with others in this unique calling or just hold moments of silence. This would be a space to encourage boldness, daring, and audacious laughter with a God who can hold our rage and continue to be a source of hope. Indeed, these dry bones can live.

Description: Why do many of us put away the crayons once we hit adulthood? We might have heard—or even believed—that "coloring is for kids" or "art is for professionals." But the church has used visual expression to connect with the Divine for millennia—and it remains a staple of our children and youth programs—so why should our personal prayer lives be any different?

Join us as we reclaim artmaking as a vital spiritual practice. Making art is more than a hobby; it is a powerful way to pray, reflect, and bring your authentic self before God. As Episcopal priest Brian C. Taylor says, "Engage in practices that enliven you, not the ones you think you should do." Come rediscover art within your spiritual being as we explore how it can deepen your faith. This is a hands-on workshop, and we will share practical ideas for your own practice or to share with others. No "artistic talent" is required—just an open heart to play and pray.

Vilmarie Cintrón-Olivieri is a Presbyterian ruling elder, educator, and "pray-artist." She was Co-Moderator of the 223rd PC(USA) General Assembly (2018) alongside the Rev. Cindy Kohlmann and currently serves with Presbyterian Life & Witness as a Global Ecumenical Liaison (GEL). D407 Making Meaning When Reading is Hard

Description: How often do you ask people to popcorn read? Or call on someone to read aloud? Have a handout with small print? Share a bulletin that is filled to the brim with text? Our faith community life, especially as we age, is centered around reading. Mainline denominations highly value academically based faith formation. Often our Sunday School classrooms, pews, and Bible studies center around the ability to see and read. Yet, reading is not a simple task for all people. Dyslexia, literacy differences, loss of eye sight, dysgraphia, and more create a barrier for all to engage in the Scriptures within community.

You'll leave this workshop with practical ways to make engaging with Scripture easier for all, tips and tricks for more readable church resources, and ideas for how to center Scripture (especially in youth and children's ministry) without outcasting anyone.

Conversations with Creation

Workshop Leaders: Ted Huffman

Offering Notes: -

Description: Story, poem, and prayer have been used throughout human history to express connections with God. Through our conversations with creation, we become more fully aware of and deeply connected to the Creator. In the Valley of the Dry Bones, Ezekiel at first perceives that all around him is inanimate, but God urges him to preach to the dry bones and they live.

In this time of climate crisis, we can imagine ourselves to be entering a valley of dry bones. In place of creation care, human greed and overconsumption have resulted in melting glaciers, bleaching coral reefs, catastrophic weather events, drought, famine, and fire. The effects of the climate crisis are not being shared evenly. Creation justice is at the center of all social justice. But this is not a time without hope. When we learn to listen and respond to Creation, the resiliency of creation comes forth and hope is rediscovered.

Participants will be guided through a series of exercises to express the stories, poems, and prayers that matter most in their ongoing conversations with creation..

D409 *The Child in Us ALL: Rethinking Children's Sermons*

Workshop Leaders: Sarah Logemann

Offering Notes: -

Description: What if the "children's sermon" became a moment of transformation for the entire congregation? This workshop explores how the traditional children's sermon can be reimaged as an engaging spiritual practice for all ages, while still centering and honoring young people. Instead of watered-down theology, trite object lessons, or moments of performative cuteness, we'll experiment with ways to cultivate imagination and play around the scripture or theme of the day.

Drawing on eight years of experience implementing this approach in multiple congregational settings, the facilitator will share practical frameworks for turning this brief moment in worship into a meaningful intergenerational encounter. Attendees will explore adaptable formats that invite storytelling, curiosity, participation, and embodied engagement, helping both children and adults encounter scripture in fresh ways. Grounded in insights from theology, pedagogy, and developmental psychology, we'll consider why playful, childlike engagement with scripture deepens attention, strengthens memory, and creates moments of shared discovery within congregational life. This interactive workshop includes real-time examples and shared practice, so you can experience these approaches, not just hear about them. You'll leave with 25 concrete ideas to bring directly into worship, along with strategies that work in congregations of varying sizes and leadership structures. Together we'll rediscover how a few minutes of wonder can open the whole congregation to new ways of encountering the divine.

Sarah Logemann is Co-Pastor at Fort Street Presbyterian Church in Detroit, MI. As a curriculum writer and educator, Sarah's work centers on cultivating wonder, imagination, and meaningful intergenerational engagement in congregational life.

D410 Facility Use Agreements

Workshop Leaders: Jennifer Perri & Chad Cunningham

Offering Notes: -

Description: Facility Use Agreements are essential for protecting ministries from the mishaps that could take place on the church property during one-time or recurring events hosted by third parties. Think of your local AA group, a scouts group, a concert, a group meeting, or even a summer outdoor gathering. While well intended by offering the church property as a place to host special events, risks can often increase and could have long-term effects if there is an accident, such as fire, an injury, or unwanted intruder. This workshop will help ministries learn best practices for creating an abiding by facility use agreements for third parties. It will include: reviewing a sample building/facility use agreement so attendees are prepared to create their own, clarity on proper insurance minimums for third parties utilizing ministry spaces/buildings and indemnification language, and how insurance is meant to cover a loss caused by a sudden, qualifying event for your ministry third parties should be responsible for their own events and risks, facility use agreement are essential.

Jennifer Perri is Vice President of United Church Insurance Services at Insurance Board. She's a tenured member of Insurance Board's team and is very knowledgeable on the various products and services offered by the company. She's also certified in Youth/Elderly boundary training and has previously presented at the APCE conference.

Chad Cunningham is the Director of Loss Control at Insurance Board. Prior to joining Insurance Board, Chad worked for Navigate360 (ALICE Training Institute) as the VP of Education and Curriculum. Description: Reading the Bible, praying together, and talking about our faith daily is foundational for passing the faith from one generation to the next. Deuteronomy 6:7 commands us to “Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up.” The actual practice of doing this over the years has been lost and appears to be dead. It’s not happening. God’s vision to Ezekiel gives us hope and can bring new life to the way we encourage daily faith talk. This workshop will address “breathing new life” into being intentional and raising the bar on faith formation in the home. Recognizing milestone moments in our lives and God’s presence in that moment, whether happy or sad, can be a starting point. Learning to engage in faith talk regularly in our homes takes practice!

E601 Adult Ed in a Purple Church: Teaching across the Divide

Description: In a time of deep polarization, many congregations feel like valleys of dry bones: fragmented, weary, and unsure how to move forward together. Political, theological, and cultural divides often surface in adult education, where meaningful conversation can quickly give way to silence or conflict.

This workshop explores how adult faith formation can become a place where communities reconnect, rebuild trust, and rediscover what matters. Drawing on the presenter's experience leading a politically diverse congregation—and insights from the book "Purple Church, Red State: Finding Common Ground in an Age of Polarization," participants will be invited to share stories from their purple church contexts and be introduced to a practical, adaptable curriculum developed for use during contentious times like election cycles. This model helped one congregation intentionally build the beloved community by integrating preaching, small groups, and adult education around shared themes and biblical texts.

Participants will leave with:

- A ready-to-use framework and sample curriculum for leading conversations across differences
- Tools for facilitating courageous, respectful dialogue in adult education settings
- Practices for building trust while engaging difficult topics
- Strategies for responding to conflict in real time while maintaining community
- Ideas for aligning worship, preaching, and education to reinforce shared learning

Through guided reflection and practical examples, this workshop equips leaders to move beyond avoidance and into faithful engagement. Even in divided times, God is still at work bringing new life to the body of Christ.

I have worked with children for almost half of my life, so I want to share tactics that I have used as well as new ideas on how to modernize children's faith formation - both with fun activities and also, with engaging content that is developmentally appropriate for specific ages (preschool through 5th grade.) The key to a successful faith formation program is to make the kids want to come so we, as the new church, must learn how to market Sunday school as something more than the ancient practice of bible verse memorization and move towards finding connections to everyday life through the teaching of biblical narratives.

Brianna Bamberg is the Children's Ministry Coordinator at Myers Park Presbyterian Church in Charlotte, NC, where she has served in a variety of positions, such a preschool teacher at their Weekday School, Manager of the Sunday Nursery program and Director of their Summer camp program, over the past eleven years. Designing Intergenerational Scripture Presentations for Worship and Ministry

Description: When it comes to planning intergenerational worship, one of the least utilized elements is intergenerational Scripture Presentation or Reading. Often, Scripture is only presented by the pastor or an adult leader. But what if we could design Scripture presentations that invite the whole congregation—all ages—to participate in leading and responding to Scripture in worship?

Participation in God's story is a spiritually formative practice; when people of different generations lead and plan intergenerational Scripture presentations together, they are spiritually formed by engaging in lifegiving, intergenerational relationships, where they can share and learn about Scripture together. And when they lead in this way, the rest of the congregation is invited to participate, too! That's why intergenerational Scripture presentations help us all participate more fully in the story of God.

Come learn Valerie Grissom's simple step-by-step process that helps ministry leaders take any Scripture passage and design an intergenerational presentation creatively to fit your context. In this workshop, participants will go home with ideas to use right away in worship (or other ministry contexts), plus participants will collaborate to design a Scripture presentation to use in this workshop. Because intergenerational means including all ages, presentations will also be designed to be inclusive of all ethnicities, abilities, and seek to help all people of the church, even those who might usually be excluded, to both lead and participate in Scripture during worship.

Description: This workshop explores practical strategies to create inclusive, supportive environments and support networks where every child can engage and grow in faith, especially neurodiverse kids. Participants will explore how a variety of opportunities abound for churches to create calm, supportive environments that can transform the way children experience church. This hands-on workshop will show Christian educators, children's ministry leaders, and volunteers how to design sensory rooms, calm corners, and buddy systems that help neurodivergent and neurotypical children regulate, focus, and fully participate in faith activities. Participants will explore practical strategies for creating safe, flexible spaces, while learning how buddy systems can foster connection, confidence, and inclusion. Through hands-on activities, group discussion, and real-world examples, attendees will leave with ready-to-use ideas, templates, and a clear plan for implementing these inclusive practices in Sunday School, worship, seasonal events, or any ministry setting. By the end of the session, participants will be equipped to build environments where every child feels seen, supported, and empowered to thrive in their faith journey.

DE501 Beyond Commonalities: Intercultural Approaches to Foster Community

Description: Churches often begin building community by emphasizing what we share in common — but whose "common" are we centering? From the language in our bulletins to when we stand, sit, or respond to a sermon, our worship spaces are shaped by assumed ways of being that not everyone shares. Programs and ministries create similar situations with people attempting to uncover how things are run, what is expected of them, and what is acceptable from indirect engagement and observations. We delay harder conversations, waiting for the "right moment" to address difference — but that moment rarely comes.

What if, instead, we began with belonging and wholeness?

This three-hour workshop invites congregational leaders, faith formation teams, and engaged members to reimagine welcome — not as a destination, but as a practice woven into every aspect of church life. Using the framework of the Intercultural Development Inventory (IDI), we will explore how to create spaces that are both safe and courageous — spaces where people across generations, backgrounds, and experiences can bring their whole selves, not just the parts that fit easily.

Whether you are working with youth, young adults, or longtime members, everyone carries unique gifts, stories, and perspectives that the full body of Christ needs. Celebrating diversity doesn't begin with inviting people to the same common table. It begins with honest, structured reflection on the spaces we've already built — and the courage to reshape them together.

Description: Around the Tiles is a three-hour, hands-on workshop that invites Christian educators to see gameplay not as a simple activity, but as a meaningful space for connection, learning, and faith formation. Using American Mahjong, Rummikub, Scrabble, and Mexican Trains as framework, participants explore how play can open doors to storytelling, belonging, and intergenerational conversation in the life of the church.

In this workshop, educators experience gameplay as learners first—discovering how patterns, strategy, collaboration, and even frustration can mirror the rhythms of Christian community. Through guided play, reflection, and conversation, we examine how tables can become sacred spaces where people of different ages share wisdom, ask questions, and build relationships across generations.

Participants will gain practical tools for creating intergenerational experiences, including conversation prompts, adaptable lesson structures, and easy ways to use gameplay in classrooms, retreats, and congregational life.

Around the Tiles invites educators to reimagine formation as something that happens not only in classrooms and sanctuaries, but also around tables—where play becomes a pathway to deeper connection, shared meaning, and faithful community.

DE504 Offsite Workshop to visit Barbie's Village

Description: In 2021 the congregation of Presbyterian Church of Laurelhurst, Portland, OR made the difficult decision to close their suburban church. But it was coupled with a great vision: to do a Land Back Gift to benefit local indigenous people.

With support from Cascades Presbytery Leadership Commission, and the Barbie's Village Task Force, the property was gifted to Future Generations Collaborative, an indigenous-led coalition, (<https://fgcpdx.org/>) and Leaven Land and Housing Coalition, a tribal run organization.

Named Barbie's Village, (<https://fgcpdx.org/barbies-village/>) the tiny home village and early childhood center for unhoused Indigenous families is named after the late Barbie Shields, a citizen of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs, and a dedicated natural helper. Since opening, Barbie's Village has served as a model for other Land Back gifts in Portland.

APCE Workshop attendees will tour the Barbie's Village campus (about 15 minutes from the hotel) and hear about the many ways the programs serve the Indigenous community. Additionally, participants will receive information about best practices for engaging in a land transfer.
